Aloha Members,

We missed a lot of you at our past General Meeting held at Keaiwa Heiau otherwise known as Aiea Loop Trail or State Park. Mahalo to those of you that attended and assisted by either bringing purple crown flowers or sewing 30 plus 12 ft. leis that were used as decorations at Ali'i Sunday and later to adorn Queen Liliu'okalani's statue.

Our guest speakers at the meeting were Elsie Ryder and Kaoi Kaimikaua. Kaoi shared that the heiau was established as a healing heiau for kahuna and their haumana to train in the practice of la'au lapa'au (medicinal healing using plants). It is unknown when this heiau was built but one source suggest that it was constructed in the 16th century by Kakuhihewa, an ali'i of O'ahu, and his kahuna Keaiwa. The 4-foot high stacked rock wall encloses the sacred area that measured 100 by 160 feet. The heiau was badly damaged during World War II when soldiers camping nearby took many stones from the heiau to build a road. The heiau was "rededicated" in 1951 and an effort was made to reestablish the historical setting with plantings of medicinal plants.

Elsie Ryder composed and shared an Oli for our club and taught it to those in attendance.

It is my hope that as members we can all learn and perform it at Hawaiian events when appropriate.

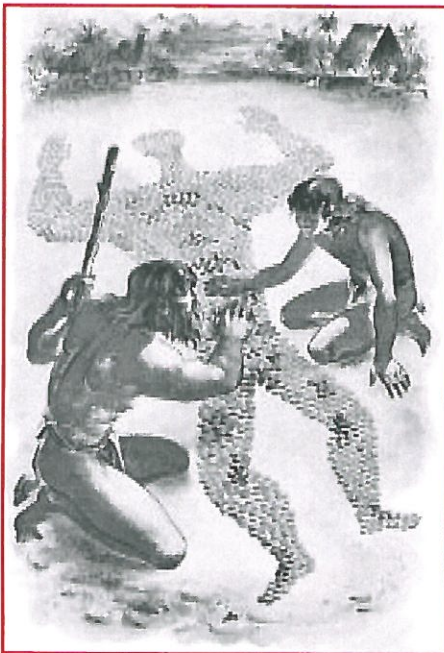

Pearl Harbor Hawaiian Civic Club August Meeting

It was a beautiful day in Hawai'i nei as we gathered at Keaiwa Heiau State Recreation Area in 'Aiea, O'ahu on Saturday, August 28, 2010 for our general membership meeting. The meeting was scheduled to start at 10:00 am, but many gathered earlier under the cool shade of the towering Norfolk pines and lofty eucalyptus trees, ready to sew crown flower lei for Ali'i Sunday honoring Queen Lili'uokalani.

Kaoi Kaimikaua shared the mo'olelo of the heiau and the surrounding area. Keaiwa Heiau is a medicinal or healing heiau known as a heiau ho'ola. At this site, the kahuna specializing in healing, would diagnose and treat various illnesses and injuries. The kahuna would also train haumana in the practice of la'au lapa'au. Many of the plants and herbs used for healing were collected from the neighboring forest while others were planted around the heiau.



Elsie Ryder taught us a beautiful oli that she composed and generously gave to the Pearl Harbor Hawaiian Civic Club. This oli shares our aloha and dedication to our community, to our ancestors and to future generations. The Pearl Harbor Hawaiian Civic Club is eternally grateful for this gift – mahalo nui, e Elsie. 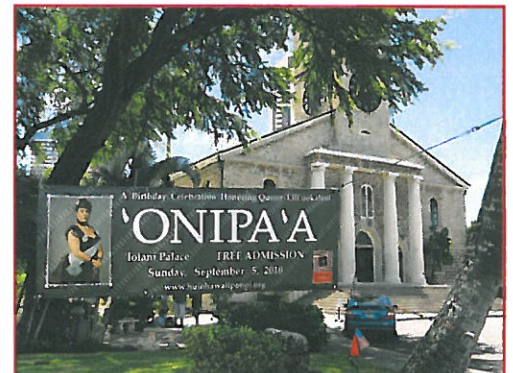

Paddlers Needed - Makahiki

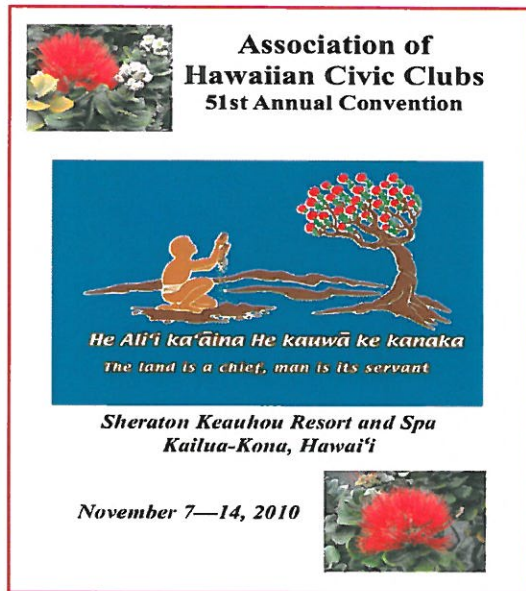
