leadership, guidance and help.



Ali`i Sunday at Kawaiaha`o Church – King Lunalilo

William Charles Lunalilo was born on January 31, 1835 in an area known as [Pohukaina](#), now part of [Honolulu](#). His mother was [High Chiefess Miriam Auhea Kekāuluohi](#) and his father was [High Chief Charles Kana`ina](#). He was a grandnephew of [Kamehameha I](#).



Lunalilo was educated at the Chief's Children's School, and at age four, became one of its first students. He was known as a scholar, a poet, and a student with amazing memory for detail. From a very young age, he loved to write, his favorite subjects in school included literature and music. He composed Hawai`i's first national anthem, E Ola Ke Ali`i Akua, or God Save the King.

Upon the death of King Kamehameha V on December 11, 1872, there was no direct heir to the throne, so the Hawai`i Legislature met to choose a new monarch. Prince William Lunalilo, was selected to be the new king.



Lunalilo never married and after a little over a year as king he died of consumption, leaving his estate to needy Hawaiians.

Upon his passing, the Royal Mausoleum in Nu`uanu was a temporary resting place for Lunalilo. By birthright, his remains could have remained there with the other Ali`i, however, his desire was to be among his people, and in 1875 his remains were moved to their permanent resting place in a tomb built for he and his father, Kana`ina, on the grounds of Kawaiaha`o Church.

Kawaiaha`o Church celebrates selected Hawaiian Ali`i who are of particular importance for the Church by holding special Sunday services in their honor. This past January 29th, Ali`i Sunday services were held for King Lunalilo. Toni Lee, LuAnn and Ken Faborito, and Ilima Dela Cruz attended on behalf of the Pearl Harbor Hawaiian Civic Club. Charles Kapua attended the services on behalf of the O`ahu Council and Kalani Akana represented Hale o Na Ali`i. Nola Nahulu led the choir and Moana Sanders sang in the choir.

College Scholarships from Kamehameha Schools

Kamehameha Schools post-high school scholarship applications are now available. All students seeking need and merit based post-high school scholarships are urged to apply for the Na Ho'okama a Pauahi scholarship and/or the 'Imi Na'auao scholarship.

The Na Ho'okama a Pauahi scholarship is a need-based scholarship available to students enrolled in associate's, bachelor's, master's or doctoral degree programs. Eligibility requirements include; applicant must be a Hawai'i resident, be a full-time, classified student at an accredited U.S. educational institution and demonstrate financial need. All applicants must complete a College Scholarship Services PROFILE at www.collegeboard.com/profile.

Applications for Na Ho'okama a Pauahi scholarships must be postmarked by April 30, 2011.

The 'Imi Na'auao Scholarship is a merit-based scholarship available to students enrolled in post-baccalaureate degree programs. Eligibility requirements include; applicant must be a Hawai'i resident, be a full-time, classified student at an accredited U.S. educational institution with a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.0, have conferred/anticipated bachelor's degree by Spring 2011, and have received the 'Imi Na'auao scholarship for one year or less.

Applications for 'Imi Na'auao Scholarships must be postmarked by March 11, 2011.
