ASSOCIATION OF HAWAIIAN CIVIC CLUBS FIRST VIRTUAL CONVENTION

The Association of Hawaiian Civic Clubs is in the middle of holding their very first virtual Convention. For the first time The Convention is being held in a span of two weeks. It started on November 11th and will end on November 22, 2020.

There was a change in the Delegates for the Pearl Harbor Hawaiian Civic Club Convention. The Delegates are:

Pearl Harbor Hawaiian Civic Club held our Pre-Convention Caucus before the Convention with the Princess Elizabeth Kahanu Hawaiian Civic Club's Delegates on November 8, 2020 after our Board Meeting. We had a lot of discussion on the Resolutions and decided which ones we would support and which ones we would ask to be amended. It was a good discussion to prepare our Delegates and Alternates to be prepared for Convention.

LEAVING A LEGACY

Webster's dictionary defines, legacy as a gift of property by will; a bequest. Over generations passed, our ancestors have more than upheld this definition to a higher level by answering the call in serving our Hawaiian people through their legacies. Such words as noble, resilient, strong, courageous and wise come to mind. Yet as a Hawaiian, I am reminded by my kupuna that "heritage" is what you "receive", but "legacy" is what you "leave".

What will that look like? As the Interim Chaplain for five years and Chaplain of the Kamehameha Schools Hawai'i Campus for nine years, I would not have attained and accomplished the many achievements in my life had it not been for the guidance of my 'ohana and the blessed by makana of education through our beloved Princess Bernice Pauahi Pahi Bishop. To attend the Kamehameha Schools from a poor background with little to offer, the opportunity to learn and to receive a distinctive education was beyond words of gratitude for my family. In my modest career of thirty-six years at the Kamehameha Schools, the highlight came in 2010, when I had desired to leave a "legacy" for our students and initiated the "Kahu Wendell B.K. Davis" Scholarship, specifically focusing on senior students of the Kamehameha Schools Hawai'i Campus Deputation Team. Since then, I had established another scholarship two years

ago honoring my wife, Mama Kahu Maria K.K. Davis at the school. In September of 2020, I decided to establish a new endowment through the assistance of the Kamehameha Schools Pauahi Foundation that would bring both scholarships into one existence in perpetuity. This gift is called, the “Kahu Wendell B.K. Davis and Mama Kahu Maria K.K. Davis – ALOHA KE AKUA” Scholarship. It will awarded to graduating seniors that have participated on the Deputation Team from all three Kamehameha Schools campuses of Maui, Kapalama and Hawai’i.

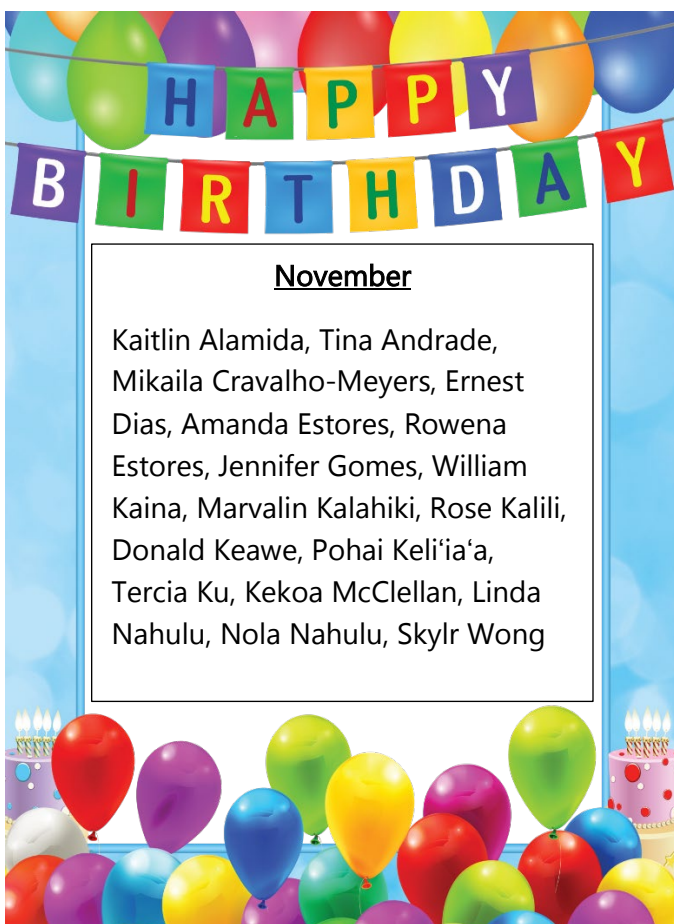
Years from now, a student may not know my name or my wife’s name, but I hope that they will remember “Aloha Ke Akua”, that “God is love”. It was this unconditional “aloha” from heaven that inspired and encouraged my wife and I to continue sharing Ke Akua for over twenty years. It was also the same love bestowed by our beloved princess that continues to inspire, transform and motivate lives. How will you be remembered? “Heritage” is what you “receive”, but “Legacy” is what you “leave”. To be the best that you can be through the heritage we receive as a Hawaiian is noble and measurable. But, to leave a legacy for the generations of our keiki to a future that we may never see is gratifying and immeasurable.

November 1, 1910; Archibald Cleghorn, Governor of O`ahu during King Kalakaua's reign and father of the late Princess Kaiulani, dies at his home, `Ainahau at the age of 74...

November 2, 1931; Mutual Telephone Company introduces interisland radio telephone service...

November 3, 1922; Governor Wallace R. Farrington officiates at the laying of the cornerstone of the Scottish Rite Cathedral at Wilder Avenue and Kewalo Street in Makiki...

November 4, 1990; Harry Weinberg dies at 82, leaving his fortune to a foundation to aid the poor...

November 6, 1850; The First Volunteer Fire Brigade is organized under Chief Engineer William Parke...

1925; The Territorial Land Board the sale of 266 Waimanalo beach lots...

November 8, 1883; Saint Marianne Cope and six sisters of St. Francis arrive in Hawaii to care for those afflicted with Hansen's disease...

November 9, 1885; The Kapiolani Home for girls born to parents with Hansen's disease is dedicated...

1940; Hawaii's Catholic Bishop Stephen Alencastre dies at age of 64. He came to Hawaii in 1882 at age 6...

November 10, 1957; Elvis Presley gave two concerts at Honolulu Stadium, this was his first trip to Hawaii, to benefit a memorial for the USS Arizona...

November 11, 1917; Queen Liliuokalani dies at Washington Place at the age of 78. The bells of Kawaiahao Church and St. Andrews Cathedral announced her passing...

November 12, 1866; Sun Yat-sen, the acknowledged father of modern China is born in a village now known as Zhongshan City, Guangdong Province in 1878, at age 13, he was sent to live in Hawaii and graduated from Iolani School in 1882...

November 13, 1895; Hawaiian Fruit & Packing Co. sends the first shipment of canned pineapples from Hawaii to San Francisco...

November 14, 1939; Benjamin Cayetano, Governor of Hawaii (1994-2002) is born in Honolulu...

Hawaii's "Lady of Love" dies at age 55...

broadcast to and from the mainland takes place.
KHHV-TV televises the Michigan State-Notre
Dame football game and, at half-time scenes of
Waikiki are transmitted to the mainland...

November 21, 1816; Otto von Kotzebue
commanding the Russian Navy brig *Runk*, visits
Hawaii. Louis Choris an artist aboard the ship,
paints Kamehameha I from life on November 24...

1921; Mrs. Wakeke Ululani Heleluhe, a long time
retainer of Queen Lili'uokalani, dies at age 80. She
was one of the charter members of the Kaahumanu
Society...

November 22, 1935; Regular trans-Pacific airmail service begins with Pan American Airways' a "flyboat" (four engine seaplane) that departs from Alameda, California and arrives in Honolulu the next day. The China Clipper was the first commercial aircraft to establish a regular travel routes across the Pacific...

November 23, 1982; Hurricane `Iwa passes just west of Kaua`i and widespread power outages ("rolling blackout") on O`ahu...

November 24, 1866; Mataio Kekuanao dies at age 77. He was the Father of Princess Ruth Ke`eikolani, King Kamehameha IV, King Kamehameha V and Princess Victoria Kamamalu...

November 25, 1890; King Kalakaua departs on the USS Charleston for San Francisco...

1909; Kauikeolani Children's Hospital opens on Kuakini Street...

1930; The Masonic order lays the cornerstone for the Shriners Hospital on Punahou Street...

November 26, 1778; Captain Cook returns to Hawai`i from the Northwest coast and begins charting the coasts of the Hawai`i and Maui...

November 27, 1823; King Kamehameha II and Queen Kamamalu sail for England aboard the English whale ship “*L’Algie*”...

1919; The new Mormon temple in La`ie is dedicated...
