SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATION 2023 - 2024

1. PURPOSE AND ELIGIBILITY

This is a new application form so please read it carefully.

The Pearl Harbor Hawaiian Civic Club Scholarship Program is designed to provide financial assistance to Hawaiian and/or Part-Hawaiian and "Non-Hawaiian" student married to a Pearl Harbor Hawaiian Civic Club Member in "Good Standing" for self-improvement through education beyond the secondary or high school level. Any Hawaiian and/or Part Hawaiian student enrolled full-time or part-time in any post-secondary educational institution is eligible and may apply for this program. There are no restrictions on the field of study or the location of study. Applicants must meet the following minimum GPA requirements: a <u>freshman or first</u> year undergraduate student must maintain a GPA of 2.0 or higher; continuing undergraduate student must maintain a GPA of 3.0 or higher. Renewal applicants must have also completed the required community service hours (20) and must meet the participation of attending PHHCC General Membership Meeting requirements for the previous year to be eligible for a subsequent award. If you are a returning scholarship applicant awards will be done differently and the application changed.

2. SCHOLARSHIP AWARDS

The award amount per recipient shall be recommended by the Scholarship Committee based on the contents of the application, and these recommendations are approved by the Officers and Board of directors of Pearl Harbor Hawaiian Civic Club. Unspent grants are to be returned to the clubs Scholarship Fund. **The Scholarship Award will be made payable and mailed to the applicant directly.**

Award recipients must complete twenty (20) hours of community service to Pearl Harbor Hawaiian Civic Club and must attend a minimum of three (3) General Membership Meetings for the Scholarship Term (July-June). The recipient and/or an 'ohana can fulfill these requirements. Any recipient who is awarded who does not meet these conditions and requirements will NOT be considered for future scholarship awards.

- **3.** The following materials and documents MUST be submitted prior to the application deadline:
- A. Current *transcript of grades for the previous term (e.g., semester, quarter).
 Final high school transcript must be submitted for first year under graduate applicants.
 +Final under graduate transcripts must be submitted for first year graduate applicants.
- B. Proof of acceptance for first year applicants.
- C. EFC (from FAFSA).

- D. A copy of your birth certificate showing proof of Hawaiian ancestry +This applies to first time applicants only.
- E. Applicant must submit a typed written essay.
- F. The Scholarship Application must be completely signed before being submitted.

4. APPLICATION DEADLINE

Completed applications MUST be post marked on or before Friday, July 30, 2023.

5. ESSAY

There will be "Two Questions" provided for you to choose from. Pick one and answer the question you have chosen in a typed essay. You are limited to 1,500 words for your essay, please try to stay within this limit; you may go over the limit.

Please answer a question noted below; complete the ESSAY on a separate sheet of paper and the word minimum of 750 words; and a word maximum of 1,500 words.

QUESTION 1. The Native Hawaiian population continues to be displaced from our pae`aina and many studies and statistics indicate that more Native Hawaiians now reside on the continent than in Hawai`i. This displacement continues to grow.
